UNIT 483 ORGANIZATION

THE UNIT

Unit 483 is made up of Pack 483 and Troop 483. Pack 483 includes boys and girls in kindergarten through the 5th grade. Young men and women do their scouting in the Troop until they reach 18 years of age or graduate from high school. For almost 70 years, Unit 483 has brought scouting to the Manvel area.

THE DENS

A group of about six to twelve boys or girls of the same age make up a Den. Dens meet several times a month to work together on various age appropriate activities as part of the Scouting Program.

THE DISTRICT AND COUNCIL

Pack 483 is part of the Thunderbird District, encompassing all of Alvin ISD, Angleton ISD, and Danbury ISD. The Thunderbird District and three other districts combine to form the Bay Area Council, based out of Galveston, TX, serving both Galveston and Brazoria counties.

THE PACK

Combine all the Dens and you have a Pack. The Pack meets once a month to celebrate the accomplishments of the individual members since the previous Pack Meeting and allow the entire group to bond as members of Pack 483. Pack Meetings are held monthly and include games, songs, skits, refreshments, and special recognition of advancements and achievements that each Cub Scout earned during the previous month. Some Pack Meetings have special activities like the Pinewood Derby in January or the Blue and Gold Banquet in February.



THE CHARTERED ORGANIZATION



Every Pack is owned by a chartered partner. Pack 483's Chartered Organization is Redeemer Church, located at 18218 Hwy 6, Manvel, TX 77578. Redeemer provides us with a meeting place to hold our Den and Pack meetings, manages the unit and controls the program of activities to support our goals and objectives. 




CUB SCOUT UNIFORMS

CLASS A UNIFORM

Class A Uniforms are the official uniforms of Cub Scouts. Tigers, Wolves, and Bears wear blue uniform shirts while Webelos and Arrow of Light scouts wear khaki uniform shirts. Each age group has a specific belt, hat, neckerchief, and slide associated with their level. The sales staff at one of the local Scout Shops can help you with all uniform related questions and help you select all of the necessary patches. They can even arrange all of the sewing for a small fee. Pack 483 only asks its members wear the official uniform shirt with appropriate patches, belt, hat, slide, and neckerchief. Any pants or shorts with beltloops can be worn with the above items. Lion Cub Scouts wear a specially appointed T-Shirt and hat as their uniform.



CLASS B UNIFORM

The Pack's optional secondary uniform that can be worn to all Den Meetings and camp outs. The Class B Uniform consists of the Pack 483 T-shirt and blue jeans or shorts. Pack shirts can be ordered through Pack 483. Ask you Den Leader for details.




RED VESTS

This is an optional addition to a Class A Uniform. The right to wear it must first be earned by participating in three District events held throughout the year. Patches and segments (small patches awarded for participation) that are earned for participating in Den or Pack activities, such as camping, field trips, and other Pack outings can be worn on this yest.

PACK 483 UNIFORM REQUIREMENTS

The following uniform requirements are the minimum uniform for the monthly Pack meetings and may also be worn to all weekly Den meetings. This uniform is referred to as the Class A uniform:

Lion Scouts - Official Lion Scout T-shirt and Lion Scout hat. Total cost for the entire Lion uniform is \$24.88 including tax.

Tigers, Wolves, and Bears - Official BSA blue uniform shirt with required patches, rank specific neckerchief and slide, Scout belt, pants or shorts with belt loops, and closed-toe shoes. Other BSA items are optional. Most scouts can wear the same blue uniform shirt throughout their years as a Cub Scout, only requiring one purchase for three years of scouting. Ensure your child's uniform shirt lasts by buying a larger size than currently needed. The Scout Shop staff can help you make your selection

Webelos and Arrow of Light - Official BSA khaki uniform shirt with required patches, Webelos neckerchief and slide, Scout belt, pants or shorts with belt loops, and closed-toe shoes. Other BSA items are optional. Again, one khaki colored shirt is all that is required for both years. Purchase a large enough shirt and the patches can be swapped for Troop patches and the shirt can be worn during the first year or two of Troop Scouting.

The Den meetings can be attended in the uniform described above or they can wear the optional Pack 483 T-shirt that is popular with the boys and their parents. This T-shirt can be ordered in youth or adult sizes for scouts and any interested family members. Prices may vary from year to year. Estimated price is around \$15. Orders are usually taken in September and February.






RECOGNITION

Each month during the Pack meeting the Scouts will receive awards for any accomplishments made during the previous month. The awards consist of segment patches for activities and special awards earned in their Den such as the Adventure Pins or achievement medals.

Advancement provides a satisfying means of recognizing scouts for their progress. Boys and girls in the program have a ladder to climb, with recognition at each step. Presenting awards to scouts in meaningful ceremonies to recognize their accomplishments is a principle of advancement. Advancement is not a competition. Each Cub Scout is encouraged to advance steadily and purposefully, setting his or her own goals with guidance from family and leaders. Measurement for satisfying requirements is "Do Your Best," and that level can be different for each child.

Advancement is one of the methods we use to achieve Scouting's aims and its desired outcomes. As scouts earn the ranks of Bobcat, Tiger, Wolf, Bear, Webelos, and the Arrow of Light, they achieve important goals in developing skills and favorable dispositions related to personal fitness, good character, participatory citizenship, outdoor skills and awareness, and leadership development. Each level of the program from Tiger to Arrow of Light is designed to achieve these goals through a series of developmentally-appropriate and fun adventures.



FINANCIAL INFORMATION

As with any quality program, there are costs required to fund that program. Our program is funded by fees charged to the Cub Scouts and by one annual major fundraiser, popcorn sales. These are explained below.

One-time registration fee - \$22.50 in August, \$18.75 in September, and \$15.00 in October

This pays for a partial year's fees to the BSA National office and for a Boy's Life Magazine subscription. Please allow at least 2 months for your son to receive his first issue.

One-time handbook fee - \$17

The handbook is available from the Pack at the cost of \$17 for a new book in order to save you the time and fuel costs to purchase at the Scout shop. After your annual dues are paid the handbook for his next year will be provided for no cost at the May Pack Graduation.

Dues - \$72 per year

Dues are \$72 for the entire year which can be paid at once in September or in 3 equal payments of \$24 in September, October, and November. The Scouting year starts in September and ends in August. Dues help fund our program and pay for all the awards, patches, and all other advancement items that your son can earn.

Annual Recharter Fee - \$45

Every January the Pack will be charged a recharter fee of \$45.00 per boy in our unit, which includes the Boy's Life Magazine subscription. The \$45 is due on the first Den Meeting in December. If your son sells at least \$200.00 in the Popcorn Fundraiser the Pack will pay this annual fee for you. See the following popcorn fundraiser information.

Popcorn Fundraiser

This is our primary fundraiser the entire year requiring sales by your son. Sales start the beginning of September and end around the end of November. If your son sells at least \$200.00 worth of popcorn, you will not have to pay the annual recharter fee of \$45. Selling popcorn is also a great way for your son to earn a patch and many fun prizes. The proceeds raised by our Popcorn Fundraiser helps us provide a quality, year-round program for our Scouts. This is the most important fundraiser for our Pack.

Uniform

Just as it is important for everybody on a sports team to look the same by wearing the same uniform, it is even more important in Scouting. The uniform provides your boy with a feeling of belonging to his Scouting group and can even help make a difference in his behavior. To keep costs to a minimum, we do not require the full uniform, although we encourage you to purchase the whole uniform if you desire.
